2018 was a year of community organizing and innovation. Our \#ExtendPenn advocacy campaign focused attention on the need to connect the protected bike lanes on Penn Avenue that begin and end at 16th all the way through the Strip District and into Lawrenceville. In the past, even the Mayor had spoken about the protected bike lane on Penn as "...an onramp" - meaning that in order to function properly, it needs to connect to the surrounding neighborhoods. Yet, after four years, there had been no progress to prioritize this connection.
\#ExtendPenn showed our community organizing bona fides and got us back to our roots as an advocacy organization that exists to make sure local municipalities are investing in life-saving infrastructure. As a result of this campaign the City promised to put bike lanes on Smallman Street in front of the Produce Terminal and put money towards a parking and mobility study for the Strip which will, in the near future, tell the Pittsburgh community where they can expect to see bike lanes in the future.

Something that continues to be a major focus of ours is advocacy for walking. In 2018 we were able to help turn dozens of people out to public meetings for the City of Pittsburgh Steps Plan which sought to assess the state of Pittsburgh's 700 plus sets of public staircases and begin to engage communities on prioritizing them, caring for them, and investing in them. You'll see more effort from us in 2019 around our city steps.

BikePGH also increased our emphasis on educational publications and videos which, by the end of 2018, numbered close to 15 and were viewed tens of thousands of times. Truly remarkable for a small team showing we can reach thousands instead of dozens of people when we focus on innovation. Our famous Pittsburgh Bike Map was redesigned and re-released in May of 2018 with some impressive design changes that finally got most of the City onto one side of the map and added all the new Healthy Ride station locations before they were officially placed.

Our events continued to break down barriers and engage tens of thousands, with OpenStreetsPGH introducing an entirely new route in the East End of Pittsburgh that knitted together Homewood, Larimer, East Liberty, Shadyside, and North Point Breeze. PedalPGH celebrated its 25th Anniversary and broke our previous fundraising record raising more than $\$ 100,000$ for safe streets for all.

While progress continues to be made, a complete vision of safe streets for all is one that has not yet been realized and we will continue to need your support and your voice to advance our mission.

## OPEN STREETS A HUGE SUCCESS

Tens of thousands participated in our fourth season of OpenStreetsPGH, our event series that opens miles of streets to people of all ages and abilities to walk, ride, exercise and reimagine our streets.

## COMPLETE STREETS

2 new Complete Streets Policies, in Etna and Millvale, brings the total to 4 municipalities who have passed Complete Streets Policies in Allegheny County.

## EDUCATIONAL VIDEOS

Our educational how-to videos were watched more than 94,000 times.


## SMALLMAN LANES

We won bike lanes on Smallman St after we collected 2,071 signatures in 2 months toward \#ExtendPenn, our campaign to extend the Penn Ave Bike Lanes to the eastern neighborhoods.

## CONTRAFLOW LANE

A contraflow bike lane on 3rd Ave in addition to some shared bus-bike lanes in downtown are an indicator that the City is trying out new things to fit bike infrastructure into our dense street network, bringing the total on-street bike network to 84 miles.

## +1,000 BIKE SPACES

Added more than 1,000 bike parking spaces to Pittsburgh in 2017 alone through our bike rack consulting services and partnership with the City.

## MGGBTKE/M/ANT COMMMGED DMTE

Out of the largest 60 cities, Pittsburgh has the 4th highest percent of walking commuters, and the 12th highest percent of biking commuters in the U.S. illustrating that investing in bike infrastructure, education and events works.

## DOUBLED OUR CAPACITY FOR ADVOCACY

We hired a Community Organizer to coordinate with existing and help launch five new neighborhood bike/ped committees, and take our advocacy to the next level.

## WE BIKE. WE

 WALK. WE VOTE. Our election work continued in 2018 interviewing all council districts about walking and biking issues and where they stood.


## PGH BIKE MAP

In 2018 we thoroughly redesigned and published the 7th edition of the award winning Pittsburgh Bike Map.

## CITY CYCLING

In 2018, we educated nearly 500 people in our City Cycling program, including expanding our adult education to more women and nonbinary people, immigrants, refugees, non-native English speakers, and veterans.

## POSITIVE SPIN

Reached more than 500 students with a combination of direct service and through our train-the-trainer program.

## 30 EARNED BIKES

30 people earned bikes through our program serving youth aging out of foster care.

## SUMMER DREAMERS

Through our Summer Dreamers Academy, dozens of students each rode 230 miles and climbed 10,580 feet of elevation over the summer.

## POSITIVE SPIN T00LKIT

We developed the Positive Spin toolkit - a guide to starting your own youth bike program. We hope this train-the-trainer model will increase the amount of schools and community groups offering youth bike education in and around Pittsburgh.

## EDUCATIONAL VIDEOS

We made more than a dozen 60 second videos that were watched by more than 94,434 people in 2018 alone.



OpenStreetsPGH brought tens of thousands of people to experience more than 12 miles of car-free streets. In 2018 we added the East End Loop that linked East Liberty, Larimer, Homewood, North Point Breeze and Shadyside together into our longest route yet.


Hosted our 17th Annual National Bike to Work Day commuter breakfasts in Downtown and Oakland.

## 25TH ANNUAL PEDALPGH

With over 2,700 riders, the 25th Annual PedalPGH raised $\$ 200,000$ for our mission.


BikePGH finished 2018 with a record breaking 3,400 donor-members who support safe streets.

## SUSTAINING MEMBERS

327 people became monthly sustaining members contributing $\$ 5$ or more per month towards safe streets.

## OUTREACH

Our Outreach Associates worked over 50 events, in over 20 neighborhoods, engaging and educating thousands of Pittsburghers.

## WOMEN \& NONBINARY PROGRAM

Women and Non-Binary Program hosted 7 bike rides, 11 coffee meet-ups, 4 bike maintenance and riding classes, and a forum with over 100 participants.

## BUSINESS MEMBER NETWORK

BikePGH's Business Member Network finished 2018 with more than 80 members.
